Ladies Lake, The Scores, St Andrews

Ladies Lake was home to the town outdoor swimming baths, until this was replaced by a house in 1968. The opportunity arose to replace the house and fully examine how a new house could interact with this prominent location and surroundings.

Reflecting the original building, the house was designed using the site topography, which minimises its impact to the exterior of the site. The ridge of the new building does not extend above the line of the existing building and hence does not have a greater impact than the original. Although the house is three storey, where possible a single storey has been presented to the south side to minimise the impact of the massing.

The building will offer wheelchair users and their families and friends the opportunity to go on holiday in an accessible building, whilst not having the aesthetic of an institutional building. The design's flexibility allows for many variations of use: from booking the whole building for sixteen people, to one apartment for two. This provides an inclusive sustainability.

The Tayberry

The renovation and extension of an existing restaurant/café aimed to provide a specific number of covers within the restaurant, while converting the first floor flat to provide a private dining space, making use of the spectacular southward views over the River Tay.

It was essential to ensure continuity throughout the project from macro to microscale. Working in partnership with a local brand agency, a material pallet was developed for 'The Tayberry' which would ensure a holistic approach to this project was maintained.

The decor is neutral and subtly Scottish, accented in purple tones, giving a nod to the tayberry which was first cultivated in the Dundee area in 1979 and named after the River Tay. Materials such as jute were used to contrast and soften the dark wooden surface of the bespoke bar which was designed by Jon Frullani Architect. The branding was reinforced and integrated into a feature wine rack behind the bar with a textured wall graphic further reinforcing the overall branding.

The judges felt that this was a really innovative project accommodating a sauna and associated facilities in two shipping containers and creating something that feels truly special.

Hot Box Sauna

The Hot Box, a new lochside development at Taymouth Marina in Kenmore, is one of the largest & most unique wood burning saunas in the UK. Created from two recycled shipping containers, the interior is lined in aspen wood and features include a sedum roof as well as panoramic windows stretching 40 ft along its length, providing magnificent views of Loch Tay and the adjacent hills.

The Hot Box is also a multi-functional venue. With its own outdoor bar, fire pit and private beach, The Hot Box is suitable for various types of event hire and is a fantastic place to get together with family and friends to simply relax and unwind.

Harris Academy

Harris Academy provides a unique and inspirational 15,000m2 facility for a school community of 1200 pupils and staff. The project is located within Dundee's West Conservation Area, and sits quietly on Perth Road as a two storey linear building, replacing the former B Listed schoolhouse that once stood. The challenging gradients of the site however, dropping some 10 metres from the road level to the rear of the site, conceals a further 2 storeys from street view, with the building revealing its four storey glass façade to the South, addressing the landscaped courtyard playground, and riverside setting.



The judges commended this project which with its energy efficient and climate intelligent design demonstrates how showrooms can and should be designed.


West Burn Lane

West Burn Lane is a private development of 14 housing units in the centre of St Andrews. It occupies a narrow plot, delineated by the medieval stone rigg walls that extend perpendicular to the main streets and consists of 6 town houses and 8 flats organised around a series of private and public court yards. The project responds to the following characteristics of the surrounding streetscape:

- The linear pattern of Rigg plots that run perpendicular to the main streets
- The distribution of small free standing buildings in amongst the gardens of the Rigg plots with clear space between, through which you can see daylight and vegetation.
- The rhythm of recesses and doorways along the narrow lanes that reflect the slow process of development of the - Rigg plots over centuries.
- The palette of natural materials that exists in the town

East Shore

East Shore comprises 135 bedrooms in 15 5-10 bed flats with common kitchen/lounges, reception facilities and main common room for students attending the University of St Andrews plus future provision for a 40 place nursery.

3 accommodation blocks are stacked parallel with the shore from the beach towards the headland, staggered in plan and section to follow the contours of the site.

Zinc pitched roofs are set within a heavy brick base that reflects the local vernacular of farm buildings of the surrounding area.

This house renovation project saw the creation of a new, near off-grid home within the shell of a former school house set in the rolling countryside just outside Cupar. The house had previously undergone many alterations and was used as two separate dwellings before the client purchased it. The existing layout was disjointed and needed rationalising to create a more cohesive space suitable for its use as a modern home.

A small sunroom, added to a house within a Conservation Area. A sensitive contemporary addition; creating a bright, open, joyful space which helps the house embrace the garden directly.

Kingsbarns is a new malt whisky distillery which preserves the external historic building fabric of the category B-listed East Newhall Farm. Simpson & Brown have created a visitor centre, with a new structure on the footprint of the existing central byre forming the working hub of the micro-distillery. Internally, the components of the original steading are respected. The horse-gang forms the visitor entrance to the distillery with access to café and shop. The modern lean-to extension adjacent to the horse-gang has been replaced with a contemporary timber and glass structure housing the new café facilities opening onto a landscaped terrace.

Accommodation includes recital spaces, individual & ensemble practice rooms, an acoustically adaptable main performance space, dressing rooms, instrument stores, recording studio, library, offices and

a physically and acoustically robust element reinforcing the perimeter of the site. Group practice spaces are arranged within, and function as either individual larger events when required.

The masonry wall forms a plinth on top of which individual practice rooms and offices are perched, expressed as lighter timber elements relating directly to adjacent tree canopies and taking advantage of distant views. At the same time, the wall creates a backdrop to the main auditorium, protectively wrapping around this galleried performance space. The auditorium can cater for full orchestral rehearsals or for smaller recitals with an audience, and is expressed externally as a special timber and bronze "object" set within a sequence of soft landscaped courtyards.

The judges felt that this project demonstrates an interesting re-use of an

buildings of the former Dens Road Market. The client's long term vision is to create an adventure play centre comprising of several active uses such as trampolining, climbing frames and ten pin bowling.

The project is aimed at providing a resource for the immediate inner city community and Dundee as a whole. Consultations with local community groups and the Stobswell Forum (Community Council) have been carried out and feedback from these consultations has influenced the content of the building programme, as well as identifying several potential partnerships with local service providers.

The design solution re-organises and connects the existing buildings through the introduction of a new central circulation space allowing the various existing floor levels to be reconciled. A courtyard has also been introduced to the proposal to allow natural light and ventilation to penetrate into the deep plan spaces.



Kelty Community Centre

In 2013 Fife Council Property Services were instructed to prepare proposals for the creation of a new community centre to serve the people of Kelty and surrounding area by replacing an existing facility. The brief was to provide a new community centre and create four additional classrooms for the adjoining primary school. Through extensive public consultation the community centre was developed as a one stop community hub providing local office facilities, library, learning kitchen, IT suite and sport facilities all linked to the Kelty Primary school.

The aim was to create a light, bright attractive environment to support all the needs of the local community and build on the success of the original community centre that no longer met the needs and aspirations of the community.

The main entrance has been created as a hub serving all the main areas of building meaning its layout could easily understood. The school is connected to the community centre through a secure link corridor meaning it has access to a wide range of facilities not normally available to a primary school.



RIBA

RIBA Regional Representative

DIA Secretary Fraser Middleton has been elected as RIAS representative for the North of Scotland on the RIBA Council taking over from Gordon Smith, Aberdeen. Alongside Kerr Robertson representing South of Scotland they are tasked with presenting the views of the RIAS and its RIBA members. Fraser is now a Trustee of the RIBA. If you have any queries or concerns over the RIBA, its agenda or how it operates please do not hesitate to contact him.

The RIBA has been undergoing some radical internal reorganisation since it recently established that its Board had been operating illegally; that it is not in fact the decision making body as previously thought. As the 'RIBA' is a registered charity, and after consulting with legal counsel, it has become apparent that the operational responsibility must lie with its Trustees; ie its Council members. The relevance of the previously extremely powerful Board (which approved accounts and policy decisions amongst other key resolutions) has been now been drawn into question.

It is hoped that as it has now been identified that the fiduciary responsibility for the 'RIBA' lies with its Trustees its operation will now become more transparent. This has been promised by new Chief Executive Alan Vallance. The powers within the RIBA have however reacted and since sought to reduce the size of its Council. Who instigated this is unknown at present although it is clear for all that if there are fewer members on Council, then there are fewer that need to be lobbied to have any necessary vote prevail. Under proposals currently being advocated; non-fee paying students will have more voting rights on Council than all fee paying Architects in Scotland, Ireland and Wales combined! That surely cannot be appropriate? Fraser has unfortunately found that the oft quoted 'London-centric' bias of the 'RIBA' has not been dissipated in his two meetings to date.

Fraser and Kerr both promise to be noisy, apposite advocates seeking to ensure that the views and best interests of fee paying Architects working in Scotland are represented fully.

Suitably resplendent in cap, tie, leather edged and embroidered gown complete with white gloves Fraser commented' It was a great honour being part of a tradition going back over 400 years; even though at times it felt as if one was an extra from "The Borgias"! Being able to represent my profession and parade in such company as the elite 'Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle' made it a truly memorable occasion'.

As well as the team trophy there is also an individual winner and a trophy played between the 5 regions that started the competition back in 1975. Scotland has won 12 times since entering in 1980.

Accommodation and the prize-giving dinner was held in the Carnoustie Hotel. A piper piped in a haggis, which was addressed by one of the Scottish team before dinner with a Scottish slant. Aircraft Carriers Visit

As a finale to last year's CPD series the DIA arranged a visit to the new aircraft carriers project in Rosyth.

Sixteen of us were given a fascinating in depth presentation on the design, construction and capabilities of these ships.

HMS Queen Elizabeth and Prince of Wales are the biggest warships ever built for the Royal Navy.

What was really impressed us was the scale of the ships, the sophistication and complexity of their design and how they were actually built.

Each ship weighs in at about 65,000 tonnes displacement and is 280 metres long.

No one shipyard was able to deliver both so sections were built on the Clyde, the Mersey, the Tyne and along the south coast. This really is a national flagship project. Some of these sections were 1000s of tonnes of steel and they were floated to Rosyth where they all fitted together with millimetres tolerance.

It does seem to be miles ahead of the building industry getting it's head round BIM.

Particular thanks are due to Helen Adamson of Babcock International Group for arranging the visit and looking after us.



Creative Spaces 2016

DIA was again pleased to be involved with the annual Creative Spaces event supplying trophies and providing support on the day. This year 22 secondary schools were paired with the 22 UNESCO Cities of Design and were asked to design and create a model of a health and well-being expo pavilion. The winning team were from Carnoustie High School with the runners up representing Monifieth High School, Perth Grammar School, and Breadalbane Academy. The designs really reflected the effort the pupils put in to the challenge – well done to all who took part.



Student Group Awards

In November 2016 DIA were pleased to again judge The University of Dundee School of Architecture's group work competition which saw teams of students challenged to design a new 'spire' to complete the composition of Logie and St John's Cross parish Church in Dundee. 17 teams entered and the DIA awarded cash prizes to four teams – congratulations to Team 3 (Philip Chen, Fiona Wang, and Mona Zhao), Team 4 (Muhammad Waie Hazwan, Mood Nur Rasul, Muhammad Haziq, and Maizatul Aisah), Team 5 (Amy Schofield, Sarah Shannon, Eilish Camplisson, and Isabelle Jescher), and Team 14 (Samuel Ho, Adrian Tomaszewski, Mahlon Asante, Ross Boyter, and Nikolas Gravos).

The Royal Arch

Our first Festival of Architecture event, working with Claire Dow an independent theatre producer, was the People's Tower: Dundee's Royal Arch back in May 2016. French artist Olivier Grosstete designed a 16m high cardboard version of the Royal Arch and in the week running up to the event 1,200 sheets of flat pack cardboard were converted into the required building blocks by various community groups and members of the public. These were then erected in Slessor Gardens, metres from where the Royal Arch used to stand, over the course of several hours starting from the top. Boxes were taped together and then lifted with the next layer being pushed underneath before taping started again. We were joined by hundreds of people and there was a great sense of community spirit. The arch remained up overnight and was lit with images coloured by local children. Then on Sunday the arch was toppled and trampled. The event attracted huge amounts of publicity and even sparked a debate on whether the stone arch should be rebuilt. We're extremely grateful to all those, too numerous to mention, who got involved and supported the project but in particular we'd like to thank Dundee City Council, BAM Construction, Gowrie Contracts, and Creative Scotland.





Introduction: The Dundee Institute of Architects (DIA) contributed to over 400 events across Scotland as part of the Royal Incorporation of Architects in Scotland (RIAS) organised Festival of Architecture, a key part of the Scotlish Government's 2016 Year of Innovation, Architecture and Design celebrations.

Several events were launched throughout October and November 2016 and we were delighted to be the Chapter selected to host the Grand Finale event as part of Dundee's 'Light Night' Christmas Festivities. The Grand Finale celebrated Scotland's architecture in a vibrant street celebration that took place throughout the city centre.

Following the theme of past, present and future, the city's historic and contemporary architectural spaces were the focus for large-scale light installations, a torchlight procession, an architectural walking trail, art and design exhibitions and a night market.

Colourful light installations highlighted the intricate construction detail of Kengo Kuma's V&A Museum of Design Dundee, creating a beacon of light on the banks of the River Tay.

The Steeple, dating back to the 15th century and home to Scotland's tallest surviving medieval church tower became the stage for Biome Collective's interactive sonic light show, inviting people to make music and light patterns in interaction with a building.

Light Night also included an installation of giant sized pods, treating passers-by to light waves and massage-like movements when hugged. Created by art duo Colony, the pods directed visitors to Dundee's newest city centre park Slessor Gardens.

Lateral North's 3D timber map of Scotland, presented at the 2016 Venice International Architectural Biennale was one of countless installations on show for two weeks at West Ward Works', a former D.C. Thomson's print factory.





A summary of the main Chapter events from 2016:

1.00 Spaghetti Racecycle Challenge

Teams from Carnoustie, Monifieth and St Johns High Schools participated in a competition to assemble a drainage run using a set number of plastic rainwater pipes. Once the drainage run was assembled, each team emptied a bin of water into the pipe work before collecting the water at the far end.

Congratulations to the winning team, Carnoustie High School, completing the drain run in the shortest time and transporting the greatest amount of water.







2.00 Enlightened Dundee Challenge

The DIA launched the Enlightened Dundee challenge inviting the general public to discover and decipher five animated light projection puzzles to reveal trades commonly associated with the building industry. The light puzzles were projected around Dundee's City Square.

Congratulations to winners Charlotte Rome and her family who have won a family trip to the magnificent 'Warner Bros. Studio Tour - The Making of Harry Potter' London.

3.00 Seabraes Yards Competition

The Dundee Institute of Architects and Scottish Enterprise announced London based Architects Studioshaw's Interactive Hub proposal as the winner of an ideas competition for a new facility for children and young people at Seabraes Yards.

DIA invited proposals for a new public space or building within the city's AIM Design-masterplanned Seabraes Yards regeneration zone.

The judging panel focused on projects that demonstrated a high level of Imagination; Fun & Play; balanced site Use; uniqueness to Dundee and delivered a strong Architectural Concept overall.

Studioshaw Director Mark Shaw:

'We are really delighted to have won the ideas competition for this key site, part of a billion pound transformation of the waterfront area of Dundee.'

The winning entry received a cash prize of £500 courtesy of Dundee Institute of Architects and Scottish Enterprise Tayside.

4.00 Crazy Golf Touring Event

Architects and designers from all over the DIA Chapter were invited to design a crazy golf hole incorporating a recognisable architectural landmark. The best nine were selected and constructed by the DIA's partner contractors and toured the Chapter throughout October and November 2016.

The tour commenced at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship in St. Andrews. The tour visited several other destinations throughout October in Glenrothes, Perth, Arbroath and Dundee's City Square at the end of October, concluding its tour at the Festival of Architecture Exhibition, West Ward Works in November.

The golfing follies were host to more than 1,000 rounds of crazy putting and has found a permanent home at Drumoig Golf Centre.

5.00 Community Unity Touring Exhibition

Architects often work collaboratively with community groups to assist with their construction dreams. Community Unity celebrated the broad variety of community led projects, built and unbuilt, from academic and professional backgrounds, each developed with the analysis and care of an architect.

Showcasing over 20 projects, the gallery toured public library venues in Dundee, Perth and Arbroath for 8 weeks in October and November 2016 and was accompanied by opportunities for the general public and community groups to engage directly with members of the profession.

A digital version of a book covering the exhibition content was created to conclude the tour which is currently available from the DIA.













6.00 DIA20Y

A book titled DIA20Y was produced by the Dundee Institute of Architects to recognise and celebrate the last twenty years of award winning architecture within the DIA Chapter.


The institute was established by architects in Dundee in 1884, and now represents a much wider geographic area than its name suggests. The geographic reach of the chapter includes Dundee, Angus, Perth & Kinross and north east Fife.

The DIA Awards are now in their third decade and have undergone a rapid growth, which has also seen a dramatic increase in the quality of the overall submissions. The annual Awards are a key part of the strategy to promote architecture via education and engagement with the general public.

The DIA20Y book brings together an archive of past winners for the first time. It is the DIA's future intention to expand this archive every decade.
